Letter from the President

Each year is unique with its own set of challenges and opportunities - technology and innovation, increasing competition, regulatory complexity, and evolving customer expectations - to name a few. Early in 2023 we saw the failure of Silicon Valley Bank, Silvergate Bank, and Signature Bank, which caused customers to question the safety of their deposits. At the same time, the Federal Reserve continued to increase interest rates to try to control rising inflation, which resulted in lower loan demand, deposit competition, and narrower net interest margins. Successes in 2023 included exceeding the \$1.5 billion asset mark, receiving strong marks on the State Exam and FDIC Compliance Audit, employee growth of 15%, expansion of our coverage area, an increase of 23% in Foundation grant applications, and progress of strategic digital transformation initiatives. I attribute the Savings Bank of Danbury's resilience and success during these challenging times to adhering to our mission of "People Serving People." A mission that remains true today, as much as it was in 1849, when the Bank was established.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

We are proud of our continued commitment to the communities where we work and live. Our sponsorships and volunteer efforts provide a vital lifeline to our local non-profit organizations that provide much-needed resources and support.

In fact, our Savings Bank of Danbury employees continued to dedicate a significant number of volunteer hours in 2023. Employees participated in the annual United Way of Coastal and Western Connecticut and Greater Waterbury Day of Action, and a team of employees participated in the Catherine Violet Hubbard Foundation's events Catherine's Butterfly Party and Race for Catherine 5K. We also participated in the Housatonic Habitat for Humanity Spring Clean Up.

Savings Bank of Danbury is committed to supporting local food banks and helping to alleviate food insecurity in our community, including the Greater Waterbury Interfaith Ministries and the Food Bank of Lower Fairfield County. In addition, our employees supported the United Way of Greater Waterbury Stock the Pantry Food Drive and Camping for Cans, collecting over 500 pounds of food. Savings Bank of Danbury employees volunteer monthly with the Community Food Rescue, a program of the Community Action Agency of Western Connecticut that provides seniors with groceries and fresh produce.

Mentoring plays an important role at Savings Bank of Danbury. Some of the programs involved include Danbury School and Business Connection, Danbury



Youth Services Summer Employment Program, Women's Mentoring Network, Waterbury Boys and Girls Club, and Junior Achievement.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Savings Bank of Danbury is proud to invest in the continuing education of our employees. The Danbury Chamber of Commerce's goal is to prepare or enhance future community leaders for positions of responsibility. Participants engage in discussions with community businesses, go behind the scenes at area establishments, build leadership skills, create a lasting network of contacts, and give back to the community with a meaningful group project.

We also recognize Kendal Joseph, Community Development Manager of our Norwalk branch, on his graduation from the Norwalk Leadership Institute and Brian Leger, First VP of Operations, on his graduation from the CBA ASPIRE Leadership Program.

Other educational programs offered to employees include the Center for Financial Training (CFT) and ABA's Stonier Graduate School of Banking.

RESIDENTIAL LENDING

We are a local lender with deep roots in the communities we serve. Our mortgage professionals continue to offer personalized attention and support from the moment our customers apply all the way through to the closing.

We offer a robust selection of products to meet the needs of our customers in the markets we serve in Connecticut and New York.

Our full suite of lending products includes fixed-rate conforming and jumbo loans, adjustable-rate mortgages, Federal Housing Administration (FHA) loans, construction loans, and down payment assistance loans through the Bank's partner at the Housing Development Fund, in addition to our own Savings Bank of Danbury First-Time Homebuyers Program, which continues to be utilized by many of our customers to recognize the dream of home ownership.

We continue to focus on leveraging technology to improve the application process for our customers and facilitate fast, local decision-making and loan processing. These improvements have led to an average loan processing time frame of less than 30 days – to the delight of our customers!



RETAIL BANKING

In 2023, our new sophisticated Customer Care Center technology was launched, helping to better serve the needs of our customers in a more efficient manner. The Customer Care Center has helped us to quickly identify any issues and work to resolve concerns with our support teams at the Bank. This new point of contact has also helped us to refine our front-line training, further enhancing the customer experience. As we move into 2024, we will continue to look for new ways to serve our customers with alternative banking channels.

Our credit card partnership with Elan completed its first full year in the program. We saw great success in this area, expanding the relationships with our customers and bringing in new customers to the bank.

Our Student Checking product continues to help us strengthen our relationships with local schools, students, and families. Our 3.0 Good To Go product uniquely positions the Bank by rewarding students for maintaining strong grades. This account rewards high school students over 16 years of age and college students as well. Since the product launched in 2019, word of mouth continues to draw new relationships to the Bank. In the past year alone, we rewarded students with a substantial amount for exceeding the 3.0 GPA requirement. We now have an ATM at Danbury High School, and we are partnering to provide financial literacy classes, further demonstrating our commitment to financial literacy in our community.

In a rising rate environment with deposits shifting from low-rate transactional accounts, we have seen a shift in balances moving into CDs and higher yield alternatives. Customer outreach has actively taken place, leveraging our strong customer relationships to retain and grow deposits. In 2023 retail banking increased "new-to-bank" checking relationships by 8%, following the strong growth of 17% in 2022.

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COMMERCIAL

In 2023, our commercial and small business lending team had another strong year in loan originations, with the portfolio growing by 15% during the year. The commercial banking team continued to focus on financial education, having delivered seminars in local high schools and partnered with Small Business Development Center on a Spanish-speaking seminar series and a small business lending series featured on WATR radio.

The commercial team continued to focus on community lending—remaining a leading SBA lender in the state. Additionally, the Bank funded many exciting community projects, supporting industries ranging from affordable housing,

food production, social services, hospitality, and manufacturing. The Bank continued to invest in personnel and processes to support the growth and risk management of the commercial area. This included staffing additions to credit, documentation, and administration.

The Commercial Banking Team continues to be heavily involved in the communities we serve, with team members holding leadership roles in many key community organizations including the Housing Development Fund, Waterbury Housing Fund, Capital for Change, Northwest Regional Workforce Investment Board, Habitat for Humanity, and the United Way of Greater Waterbury.
